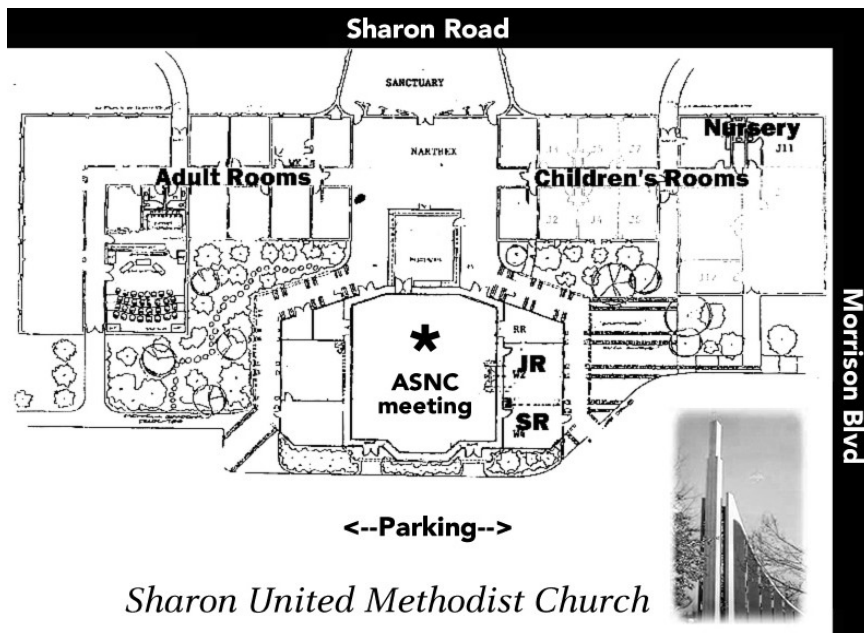




Your presence is requested for our Thursday May 1st Meeting

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President's Note:

It's the first 80 degree day and I am sitting on the bench swing at the farm, watching my son, Paul, hone his horseback riding skills. My brain is thinking, "Lean forward when the horse begins to trot, not backwards. It is much easier to keep your balance." Of course, he's across the field and couldn't hear me if I yelled. Also, all that "wisdom sharing" is not my job at the moment. Letting someone else do the teaching is what I need to do now. Bittersweet. When he was a toddler, I never dreamed I'd be watching him ride a horse all by himself, something I learned to do as a pre-schooler. I am so lucky. Even though I can't compare him to what I was like at 11, Paul is very much, a different boy than he was when we first got news of the "A" word. A gorgeous day and I am fretting the small stuff— as usual— wishing I could crawl inside his skin and help him do it right. My friends with typical kids say this is normal Mom behavior. They too have often wished at times to live life for their kids: keep everything moving forward smoothly and save them from those painful bumps in the road we've all endured. Yes, that is all true, but sometimes I think life with Paul is like living under an amplifier. Noise is louder, feelings -more intense, actions -more real. My sense of helplessness is stronger too. It is a tough balance: holding up the supports so he can succeed, yet letting go at the same time so that he learns to be independent. I don't do helplessness well, but Paul and I have several years to perfect our balancing act.

Yesterday was Autism Aware Fare. It was great to see the support so many of you provided. On Tuesday night, at their 2nd Annual Autism Awareness Fair, Collette Pendergrass made a point to remind the crowd of our event and urge them to support us. This week, some of our board members wore their new "Ask me about Autism" buttons while out and about. The reaction from the public was welcome. Several people asked for more information. One man shared how much he learned from the table tent at one of our Aware Fare Restaurants. Spreading awareness is really what our event is about. Raising money is nice, but if the public gains knowledge and the ability for quiet understanding, then we have done our job. Throughout the day it was nice to see and hear about the deliberate efforts so many of you made to support each other through our Aware Fare Fundraiser. Next month, Betsy will send personal thank-yous in Autism Matters, but with all this so fresh in my mind, I want to thank you now. It is nice to enjoy the icing on the cake, once in a while.

Aware Fare ushers in the end of the season for "Autism Matters". Only one more issue left this year. Next month is our annual teacher appreciation issue where we publish your positive sentiments for your child's teachers. With the end of "Autism Matters" this year, our board will begin moving from chapter to affiliate status. Although only a few people will be doing this valuable work, we still need your help. 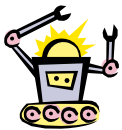

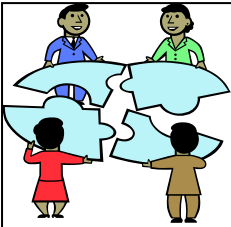


Dave Hamrick Audio Tapes

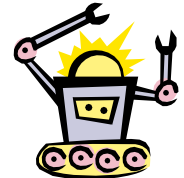

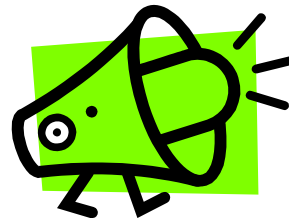
Would you like to be part of a local focus group?

Pre-School Social Skills Starting in May

Carolina Family Frontiers is now providing the opportunity for children diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorders to practice social skills building in a comfortable, safe environment. The group's goals, depending on the child and age, may include, but are not limited to: greetings, sharing, turn-taking, conversational skills, negotiating, waiting, joint attention, social cues, emotions, peer responding, cooperative play, Theory of Mind, and Executive Functioning Skills. Social skills are the foundation from which all learning occurs! Without the direct teaching of social skills, some children may find the world of learning a difficult one to navigate. By providing successful opportunities in a small social skills group, with the ultimate goal of generalizing the skills to a larger group (e.g., school, park, cub scouts, Sunday School, and the community at large), the child is "set-up" to succeed.!

The Social Skills programs are designed for small groups ranging in ages from 5-7, 8-10, and 11-12. (minimum 2 children per class-maximum 4 children per class). Cost for the six week duration is \$375.00 plus a \$35.00 joining fee.

Starting in May, classes will be available for 3-5 year olds on Thursday afternoons at 3:30. Several slots are available. Groups will meet at My Child and Me Fun Center in Indian Trail. Current Topics: Initiatives From ASNC - Raleigh

In the current issue of The Spectrum, Tracey Sheriff, Interim Executive Director of Autism Society of North Carolina, detailed several initiatives that concern our families and that ASNC is working on. With a 30 year history of advocacy for those on the spectrum throughout the state, ASNC continues to be committed to the development and maintenance of programs which support us. Below is a brief summary from The Spectrum of some of the issues, advocacy targets, and how ASNC is working to meet those needs:

Issue: CAP-MR/DD waiver waiting lists

The CAP-MR/DD waiver provides families and individual with autism access to critical therapies and instructions which they could not afford to acquire without undue financial hardship. Across the state, those with autism needing community based services have been on waiting lists for several years. ASNC has worked with the Division of MH/DD/SA, the Division of Medical Assistance, and other advocacy groups to create a new tired CAP/MR/DD waiver so that more people can be served with more appropriate services.

Issue: Early Intervention

Research has pointed to the overall positive results for children on the spectrum when interventions occur in pre-school or earlier. ASD Partners, the sector of ASNC which is dedicated to training others how to effectively work with those with autism, is currently operating under a state grant for early intervention in three test sites. Through this test work, will develop different strategies that parents, case managers, pediatricians and others can use with individual clients. In time this should increase the professional skill of providing agencies and others working with our family members

Issue: Insurance

In our state, only 2% of health insurance policies include developmental disabilities and autism services in their coverage. Currently ASNC is consulting with other autism advocacy groups, including Autism Speaks, who have successfully passed insurance legislation in other states in order to expand private health insurance coverage to include those on the autism spectrum. Fortunately, ASNC employs an extremely experienced lobbyist who specializes in insurance reform to help with our course of action.

Issue: Crisis Services

Throughout the state, crisis programs are inconsistently available and difficult to access. Along with the use of Parent Advocates who assist parents in accessing the crisis supports that are available in their area, ASNC, along with other groups, are working with Mental Health officials and LEAs to create a consistent, comprehensive crisis prevention and response system.

Issue: Adolescent and Adult Support

With so many teens entering adulthood in the coming years, current funding will not be sufficient to fund necessary vocational, community living, and residential services. ASNC, along with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, waiver workgroups, and the Coalition are working to eliminate the VR waiting lists for assessment and job placement. We are also working to increase funds for housing and employment supports.

Issue: Staying Safe in the Community

Due to the nature of autism, members of our families may not perceive dangerous situations; therefore, we must work to educate safely personnel on the features of autism, as well as, to teach those with autism ways to remain safe in the community. ASNC is working on many levels to achieve this goal. Parent advocates offer "Staying Safe in the Community" workshops and safety kits for families and all public safety officials. ASNC is working to expand autism specific training beyond first responders and police, to include magistrates, judges, prosecutors, and defense attorneys, as well as, school officials where anti-bullying policies are being developed.

Issue: Collaboration with other public policy groups

With the population of citizens affected by autism growing, while government financial resources diminish, only careful planning and use of coordinated effort with public groups such as, the Coalition, DD Consortium, Special Needs Federation, Exceptional Children's Assistance Center, Disability Rights, and AutismSpeaks can we insure that necessary supports and freedoms be in place for our family members with disabilities.
